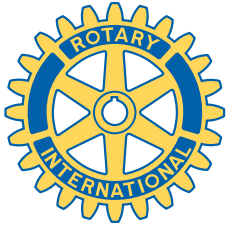

AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLARSHIP SOUGHT FOR 2010-2011

Applications for the 2010-2011 Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships are now available from Rotary District 5960. Local club deadlines are April 1, 2009. District deadline is April 9, 2009. Required, in-person interviews will be held **Saturday, April 25, 2009**, at the

Boy Scout Office in St. Paul, Minn. For further information and to print an application, go to www.rotary.org and click on Students and Youth.



The scholarships, which are designed to further international understanding and goodwill, provide for study abroad for one year in one of the 162 countries and 35 geographical regions where Rotary clubs are located. Some 1,200 scholarships will be available from clubs worldwide.

Academic-Year Ambassadorial Scholarships are for one academic year abroad and provide funding for round-trip transportation, tuition and fees, room, board, necessary

educational supplies, and language training (if necessary) up to a maximum award of US \$23,000 or its equivalent.

During their studies abroad, Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholars act as "ambassadors of goodwill." Through appearances before Rotary clubs and districts, schools, civic organizations, and other forums, the scholars represent their homelands and work to further international understanding.

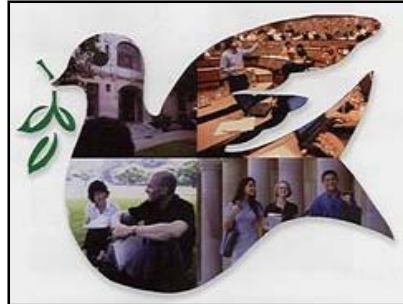
The Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships Program is the world's largest privately sponsored international scholarship program. Some US \$320 million has been spent on 30,000 international scholarships since the program began in 1947.

ROTARY WORLD PEACE FELLOWSHIP NOMINEES SOUGHT FOR 2010-2012

The Rotary World Peace Scholarship offers offer 60 individuals committed to peace and conflict resolution the opportunity to earn a two-year master's level degree in international studies, peace studies and conflict resolution at one of the Rotary Center's University partners. Rotary has contracted with six institutions worldwide to provide this valuable training. Our district can submit nominees to Rotary International by July 1, 2009. Final awards will be announced by year-end. Deadline for completed applications to **local clubs is April 1, 2009.**

What's expected of World Peace Scholars?

- impact world peace and conflict resolution in a significant, positive fashion during their future careers
- demonstrate a commitment to a career in peace and conflict resolution
- excel academically in their selected programs, accept the academic counsel and advice of the Rotary Center director, and obtain a master's degree or certificate at the conclusion of their scholarship period
- participate in an annual Rotary Center seminar
- serve as ambassadors of goodwill wherever they go
- make formal and informal appearances before Rotary clubs and districts, school and civic orgs, etc.
- participate in district, regional, and international Rotary events
- maintain contact with The Rotary Foundation throughout their professional careers in order to advise and assist Rotary International and its member clubs in their efforts to contribute to world peace and understanding
- help evaluate and promote the Rotary World Peace Scholarships program
- accept assignments to a Rotary Center outside of their home countries

Who can apply? Who cannot?

Applicants for the Rotary World Peace Scholarships must have:

- the academic background, training, and work

experience required for a master's level program at the partner universities

- proficiency in more than one language (even if they propose to study in a country where their native language is spoken)
- excellent leadership skills
- a demonstrated commitment to peace and international understanding through their personal and community service activities and/or academic and professional achievements

The following are ineligible to apply:

- Rotarians and honorary Rotarians
- employees of a club, district, or other Rotary entity or of Rotary International
- spouses, lineal descendants (child or grandchild by blood or legal adoption), spouses of lineal descendants, or ancestors (parent or grandparent by blood) of any living Rotarian and former Rotarians and their relatives as described above within 36 months of resignation.

How does one apply?

Application must be made through a **local Rotary club** in the applicant's legal or permanent residence or place of full-time study or employment. People with disabilities and members of Rotaract clubs are eligible and encouraged to apply. The scholarship selection process consists of three levels: club, district, and world. After receiving applications, Rotary clubs forward their candidates to the Rotary district level for competition.

Club **deadlines** must be by April 1, 2009 for 2010-12 Rotary World Peace Fellowships. We need to allow enough time for a district interview and selection process to meet the deadline for submission of our nominee to The Rotary Foundation.

- April 1, 2009 DEADLINE TO LOCAL CLUB.
- April 9, 2009 DEADLINE TO 5960 DISTRICT OFFICE.
- Saturday, April 25, 2009; 8 a.m.-5 p.m. District interviews will be held at the Boy Scout office in St. Paul. **Candidates must be available for an in-person interview on this date.**
- July 1, 2009 ... District 5960 nominee forwarded to The Rotary Foundation in Evanston.
- November 2009 ... District Chair and candidates will be notified of results of world competitive selection process.
