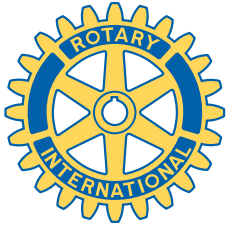

ROTARACT

Rotary International created Rotaract in 1968. The new organization was designed to promote responsible citizenship and leadership potential in clubs of young men and women ages 18-30. The first Rotaract club was chartered by the Rotary Club of Charlotte North in Charlotte, North Carolina, USA. In 2006, there were 184,000 members in more than 8000 Rotaract clubs in 239 countries.

Rotaract clubs emphasize the importance of individual responsibility as the basis of personal success and community involvement. Each club is required to complete at least two major service projects each year, one to serve the community and the other to promote international understanding. Rotaract also provides opportunities leading to greater leadership and professional development. Rotaractors enjoy many social activities as well.

WHO TOUCHED YOU?

Paul Harris was touched by the fellowship of a small Illinois town before he conceived the idea of Rotary. While visiting a friend in a Chicago suburb, his host took him for a stroll down Main Street, introducing him to merchants and shop owners along the way. The fellowship he experienced there had much to do with the inception of Rotary International.

Who touched you? When did Rotary touch you?

Many of us were touched by Rotary before we were Rotarians. What happens for Rotation Day?

All members either host or are assigned a place to go for lunch. This goes back to the early days of Rotary when Rotarians rotated their meeting site each week. It gives you the opportunity to get to know each other a little better and find out about your host's occupation.

What is the Host's Responsibility?

Hosts sign up and give the number of members they would like to accommodate for lunch. This can vary from a minimum of six to whatever number you have room for. Hosts are given a list of names to host, and they invite their guests - giving directions, etc. They order lunches. All members have already paid for their Rotation Day lunches with their dues so all the host has to do is submit a billing to the office for the lunches.

During the meeting time, 12 – 1:30 p.m. – members can introduce themselves and the hosts can tell about their occupation and in some cases go on a tour of their facilities. They take attendance and turn it in to the office.

What to Those Attending Do?

First and foremost, **respond to the host**, let them know you are attending so they can order lunches and prepare for you. For those of you that have email, you will probably hear that way.

What if I Cannot Attend?

Please let us know you are not planning to attend so we don't assign you.
