What Do I Need To Do To Be A Mentor?

1. Go to <http://www.rochesterrotaryclubs.org/STRIVE>. Click on the 'STRIVE Mentor Sign Up' to access the STRIVE Mentor online application.
2. Attend the STRIVE Mentor Orientation on Friday, September 21 from noon – 1:00 in the auditorium at the Rochester Public Library (feel free to bring your lunch). You will receive confirmation of which school you will be at, find out who your student is, receive an agenda for the year and tips on making a strong connection with your STRIVE senior.

ROTATION DAY - October 4

What happens for Rotation Day?

All members either host or are assigned a place to go for lunch. This goes back to the early days of Rotary where Rotarians rotated their meeting site each week. It gives you the opportunity to get to know each other a little better and find out about your host's occupation.

What do hosts do?

Hosts sign up and give the number of members they would like to accommodate for lunch. This can vary from a minimum of six to whatever number you have room for. Hosts are given a list of names to host and they invite their guests – giving directions, etc.. They order lunches – all members have already paid for their Rotation Day lunches with their dues so all the host has to do is submit a billing to the office for the lunches.

During the meeting time, 12-1:30 p.m. – members can introduce themselves and the hosts can tell about their occupation and in some cases go on a tour of their facilities. They take attendance and turn it in to the office.

What do those attending do?

First and foremost, respond to the host – let them know you are attending so they can order lunches and prepare for you. If you know you are not going to be available that day, please let us know in advance so you will not be assigned. For those of you that have email, you will probably hear that way.

If you have not heard where to go by noon the day before the Rotation Day, please call the office – 252-0085.

ROTARY AREAS OF SERVICE

(Each month President Kim has asked her board to write an article describing their area of service. This month President-Elect Doug Rovang talks about Rotary membership and the Joint Membership/PR Committee.)

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT - One of my responsibilities as president-elect is membership development under Club Service 1 Director Linda Rings. Why is membership growth important for Rotary in general and our club specifically? The July issue of Rotary World magazine lists the following reasons:

- Membership growth increases Rotary's capacity for service.
- New Rotarians bring fresh ideas, new interests, and increased energy to clubs.
- More members increase the volume of support for The Rotary Foundation.
- Diversity in membership ensures that the club is relevant to the entire community.
- Service-minded individuals are given an opportunity to help their communities through Rotary.
- More members create a larger network for both local and international fellowship.
- New and younger members ensure the future of Rotary and its work.

Having a large club (approximately 250 members) enables our club to accomplish many worthwhile things in our community and through Rotary International. To keep our club strong, every Rotarian must share the responsibility of bringing new people into Rotary. Those new members should ideally reflect our community's demographics, including professions, gender, age and ethnicity. In order to establish and maintain the interest and dedication of new (and "experienced") Rotarians, we need good club fellowship and involvement in service projects.

JOINT MEMBERSHIP/PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE - A joint membership/public relations committee has been formed with participation from all three local Rotary clubs. This past year, with budgeted funds and a \$3,000 grant from Rotary International, the committee presented the message of Rotary to the community through a "campaign" of newspaper and public radio ads, banners, window clings and bus advertising with the goal of making our community more aware of Rotary and the things Rotarians do, as well as piquing peoples' interest in Rotary as the service organization they might like to join.

As current Rotary International President Wilf Wilkinson has written in the July issue of Rotarian magazine, "I have always felt that the essence of Rotary is about sharing. Every day, in every club, Rotarians share with others in too many ways to count. We share our time, we share our talents, and we share our resources."

ROTARY SEEKS BUSINESS/PROFESSIONAL PEOPLE FOR EXCHANGE WITH PERU AND BRAZIL

A once in a lifetime opportunity! Too good to be true! A life-changing experience! These are phrases past participants have used to describe the Rotary International Group Study Exchange Program.

Group Study Exchange (GST) is a unique educational experience that furthers international understanding by providing an opportunity for outstanding business and professional people to study another country, its people, its culture and its institutions. Each GST team visits a Rotary district in another country for four weeks. Team members stay in the homes of Rotarians, if possible, and follow an Itinerary of educational and cultural points of interest.

A Rotary District 5960 GSE team will visit **Peru** from **April 5, 2008 - May 5, 2008**. A second GSE team will visit **Brazil** from **April 29, 2008 - May 28, 2008**. Rotary offers this opportunity to spend a month living with local Rotarians and seeing the country in a way few will ever experience.

The teams will consist of four non-Rotarian professional or business people and a Rotarian team leader. Candidates

must be engaged in a recognized business or profession on a full-time basis for at least the past two years. Employers must give permission for the candidate to participate BEFORE the interview process. Candidates must be between the ages of 25-40 years and must live or work within the limits of Rotary District 5960. Applicants cannot be spouses or lineal descendants of current Rotary members. Applicants must be citizens of the USA.

All applications must be received by OUR club by September 22, 2007. District level interviews will be held on Saturday, October 13, 2007, for candidates applying for Peru and Saturday, October 27, 2007, for those applying for Brazil. Applicants must be available all day, starting at 9:00 a.m. for interviews which will be held at the Northern Boy Scout Council's Hulings Scout Service Center, 393 Marshall Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota.
